- Monday, May 8th, 2017 a Mid-Shore GIS Committee meeting was held at the Talbot County Public Works building in Easton. Representatives from the ESRGC, City of Cambridge, Dorchester County, Talbot County, City of Easton, Michael Baker Consulting, Queen Anne's County, and Kent County were present.

Updates were offered regarding recent activities of the counties, non-profits, private industry and ESRGC.

Discussions included:

Blight study continuation in City of Cambridge (a collaboration with Department of Geography at Salisbury University), Drone Program and usage in Queen Anne's County, Queen Anne's County's adoption of a digital zoning layer, Broadband Task Force - RFP put out for fiber that would serve all of Queen Anne's County, RFP for impervious surface in Queen Anne's County, Dorchester County working with Parks and Recreation to identify park distribution, Dorchester County working with floodplain layers for economic impact study with hazards, NextGen911: consultant/subject area expert (Mission Critical) has been assigned with assessing data quality and conformance as well as evaluating software/hardware requirements across the state, Easton and Talbot County working with historic preservation in hazard areas, and Kent County's comprehensive plan going out for review.
